Once restrictions were lifted, we got together face-to-face for a few Play Reading Social evenings, which are always great fun and a wonderful way for members to keep in touch. We have read comedies, ghost stories and self-penned plays.

We could not wait to get back onto stage and with the Civic Hall still closed, in December 2021 we performed a self-penned play and self-penned panto for two sold out nights in the Neston Town Hall.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our outgoing Chair, John Lees who guided the society through a most difficult period, for which we are very grateful. I would also like to thank our dedicated committee who have also served the society so well.

The Author

Mike Kenny is one of Britain's leading children's playwrights, and was included in the Independent on Sundays list of Top Ten Living UK Playwrights. His adaptation of E. Nesbit's The Railway Children won an Oliver award for Best Entertainment and has toured worldwide.



The Play

Mike Kenny's imaginative stage adaptation of E. Nesbit's much-loved children's classic. Famously filmed, this story of a prosperous Edwardian family - mother and three children - forced into near-penury in the rural north of England, captures the anxieties and exhilarations of childhood with great tenderness and insight.

As Mike Kenny says of his remarkably faithful adaptation, 'You don't need a real train to perform this play... the most powerful prop is the imagination of the audience, the most effective tool the skill of the actors and wherever it is performed the cry of 'Daddy! My Daddy!' is likely to provoke a tear.

Mike Kenny's version of The Railway Children was first staged at the National Railway Museum in York in 2008, before receiving a major production at Waterloo Station in London in 2010.



Directors Notes

Directing a story as iconic and heartwarming as The Railway Children has been in equal measure, thrilling and intimidating. Perhaps it's just us, but think The Railway Children and you conjure a rainy afternoon on the sofa in a big, cosy sweater, with a mug of something warm in the comforting presence of Jenny Agutter and the late Bernard Cribbins. It's a story that has significance as a classic of children's literature, a milestone event in British cinema, and has shaped the childhoods, we are sure, of many of our Neston audiences.

The mild and creeping terror of doing this tender, sentimental story justice has been made much easier for us by Mike Kenny's beautiful and playful script, which sees the grown-up children remember their many adventures in Oakworth with station master Perks, the kindly Old Gentleman, refugee Mr Szcypansky and more.

Playwright Mike Kenny says that in telling this story for the stage "the most powerful prop is the imagination of the audience". As directors, we used this as our jumping off point - we decided from the offset to be prop and set light, and to have our waiting room ensemble do a lot of the work - transforming from villagers into scratching rats; from interrogators into a

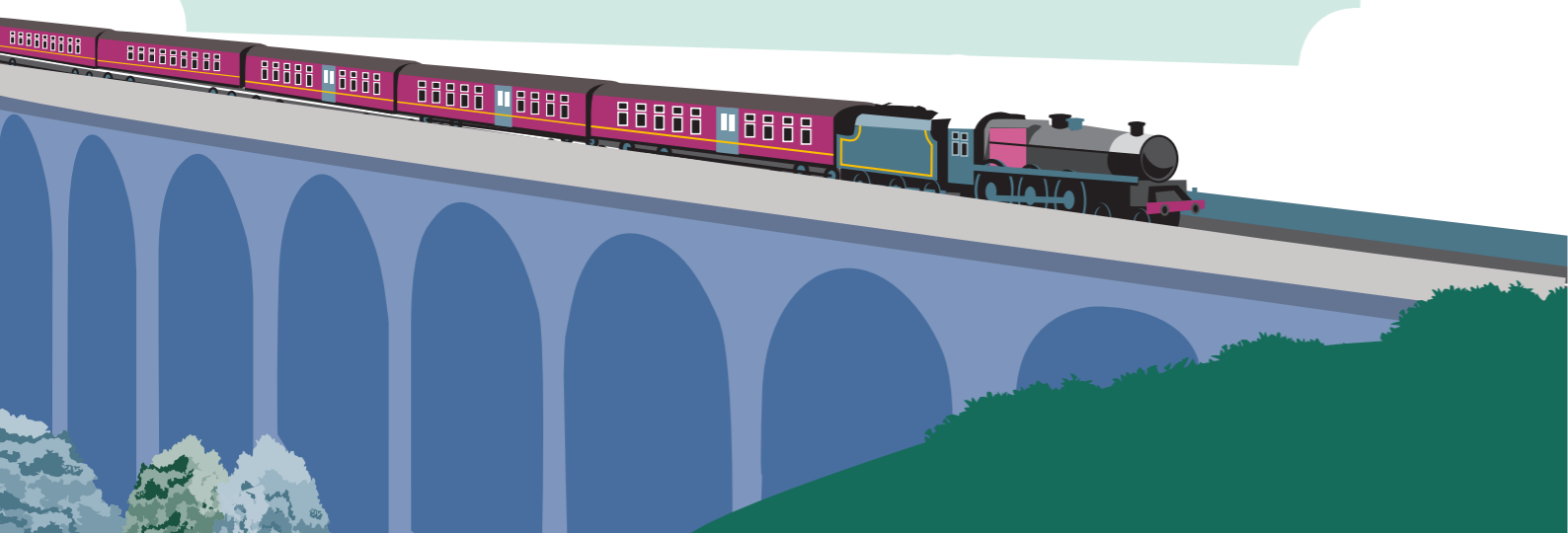
dangerous landslide! We ask that you use your imaginations too as you join us on the ride.

We also decided to stage the show on a traverse set, with the railway track rostra running the length of the Civic Hall, in direct homage to the original staging of this version of the show, which Co-Director Ruth saw at the National Railway Museum in York.

Our cast have thrown themselves into rehearsals and embraced the spirit of Mike Kenny's script, and we've had a lovely time directing, ably assisted by the wonderful backstage and technical crew at Neston. We would very much like to thank everyone who has been involved in getting this show on track, particularly the Neston Players Committee for trusting us with such a classic and always being so positive about the production.

So all that's left to say is to ask you to take your seats in the carriage, dim the lights and enjoy a relaxing couple of hours with Bobby, Peter and Phyllis in Oakworth. All aboard for The Railway Children!

70 Years in Neston

It is 70 years since our society was founded in 1952 by Ron Kidd, a minister of the Presbyterian church who originally gave his merry troupe the name Neston Presbyterian Players. Ron was very much a fan of amateur dramatics, though some of his congregation felt that it was not a fitting pastime for a minister. Ron was not deterred by the congregation's opinions, for which generations of society members and audiences alike are very grateful.

In the 1970s, the word 'Presbyterian' was dropped from our name and shortened and Neston Civic Hall became the Players' home venue.

Since starting up in 1952, Neston Players have staged over 130 full length plays, over 20 one-act plays and even a few pantos. We have been recognised by professional body NODA (National Operatic and Drama Association) and won many awards.



We have written and performed some of our self-penned plays and collaborated with community based Hip & Harmony on two of them.

We have taken performances into the community residential homes and nursing homes which is really rewarding.

The Society is proud of its rich heritage and accomplishments and continually strives for higher standards of production.

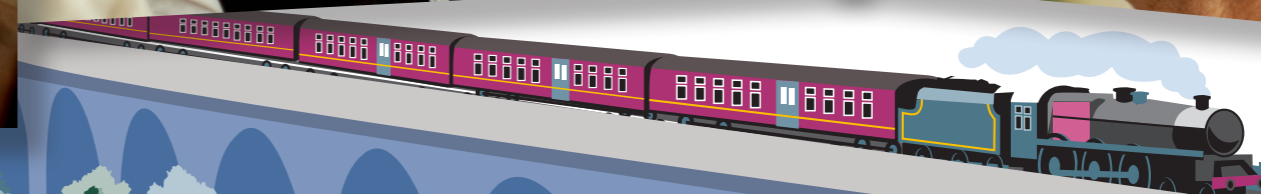

 I like rollerblading, artwork & bead jewellery.



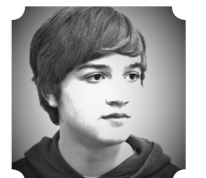

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Producing the teaser trailer for The Railway Children marks the 6th time Neston-based Chat Noir Productions has worked with Neston Players.

Our intention was to create a mini movie, rather than simply record parts of a stage rehearsal. It was filmed in a vintage style to capture a sense of the past, even going as far as using lenses dating from the 1960s. As with the trailer for 2019's The Importance of Being Earnest, the highlight of this shoot was being able to film with the cast in costume, on a suitable period location, in this case Hadlow Road Station in Willaston. We were lucky on the day, dodging both rain and members of the public. The final trailer has exactly the look and feel we'd hoped to achieve - capturing a mix of childhood fun and nostalgia.

Following the regrettable cancellation of this production in 2020 because of the COVID pandemic, Neston Players have made the decision to restage this production from 8th to 11th November 2023.

This evocative and modern play retells the historic events surrounding the political and moral conflict between King Henry VIII and the Lord Chancellor of England, Sir Thomas More. The King wishes to have his marriage to his first wife Catherine of Aragon annulled in order to marry Anne Boleyn. He expects his Chancellor to sanction and approve this. More is caught between his obligations to the Crown and his belief in the Catholic Church's teachings and he attempts to maintain his integrity and follow his conscience. This decision sets the King's allies against him and they attempt to persuade then entrap him.

Directed by Martin Riley, "A Man for All Seasons" is a powerful story based upon a taut script. It has memorable characters and despite its tragic outcome it has moments of high drama and clever humor.

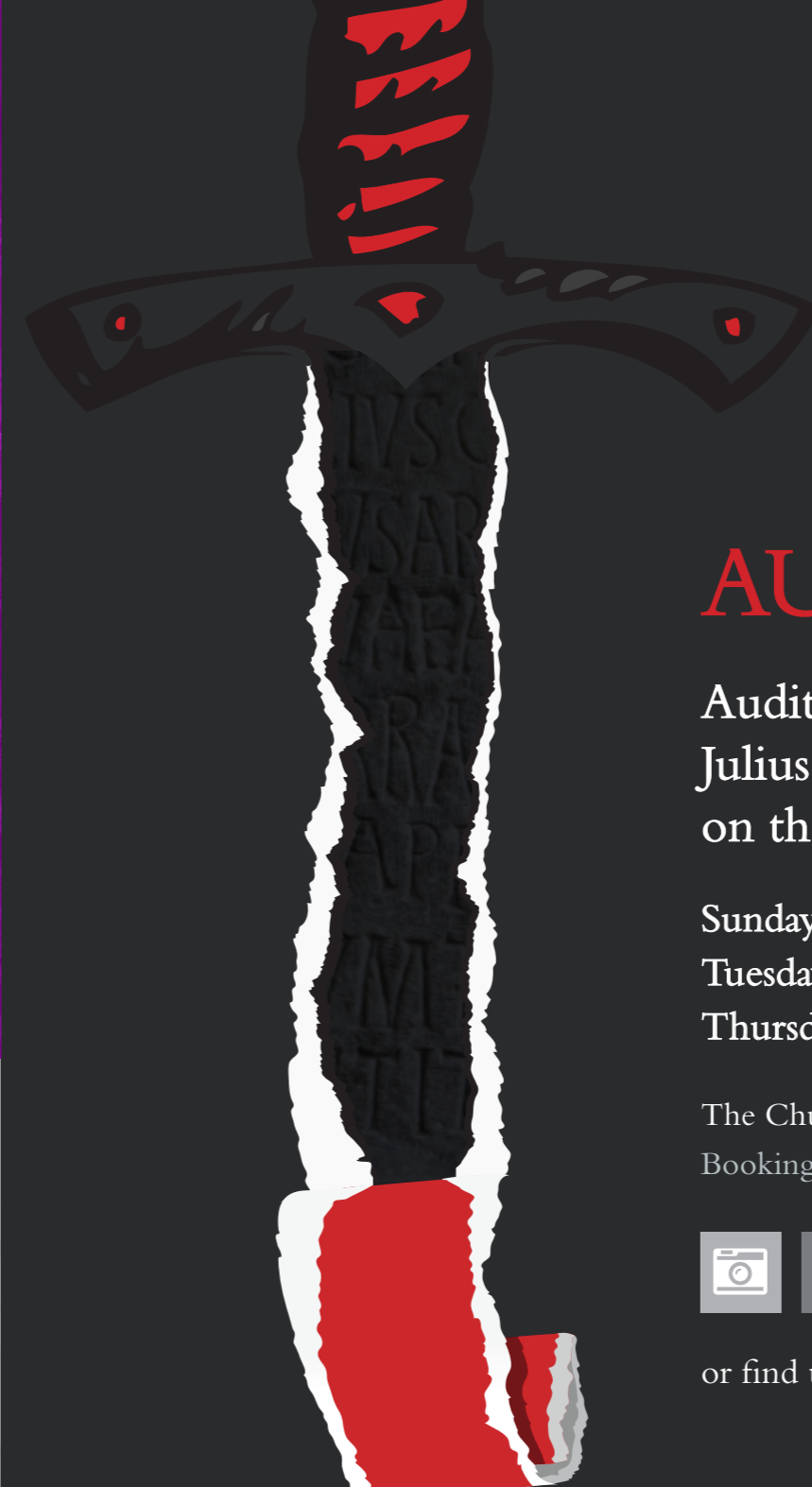
